

Program Variety

Because people have different reasons for studying English, the ALC offers a full-time intensive academic program focusing on all language skills (including highlevel university preparation) and a full-time intensive communication program emphasizing listening and speaking skills. In addition to offering individual English courses, the ALC specializes in English programs for the workplace and other custom-designed programs.

Educational Pathways

When you finish your English studies and if you meet the requirements, you can enter one of more than 50 UCLA Extension certificate programs, enroll in UCLA Summer Sessions for UCLA credit, or continue your studies in a community college, university undergraduate, or graduate degree program.

Student Services

Since you will need an F-1 student visa for our intensive programs, the ALC staff and International Student Office (ISO) will provide necessary documents and assistance.

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Location, Location, Location

Southern California is a land of contrasts, with sunny beaches, lush gardens, Wild West deserts, and snowcapped mountains. Not far from Las Vegas and the Grand Canyon, the region boasts its own attractions, including Disneyland, Sea World, and Universal Studios. Cities like Santa Barbara, Palm Springs, and San Diego are all just a few hours away.

Los Angeles

Located on the Pacific Coast in the southern part of the state, Los Angeles (L.A.) is the largest city in California. The warm, sunny year-round climate is ideal for outdoor sports and recreation, including swimming, surfing, golf, tennis, hiking, and many other activities.

The American Language Center (ALC)

As one of the departments within UCLA Extension, the ALC provides English language training to speakers of other languages. The ALC offers:

- Full-time intensive English programs
- Part-time individual courses
- On-site English for the workplace
- · Other custom-designed programs

ALC classes usually take place at UCLA Extension's Lindbrook Center, a beautifully designed building located in the heart of Westwood Village. The building offers modern, well-equipped classrooms, state-of-the-art language and computer labs, a large student lounge, and an outdoor patio overlooking the lively neighborhood.

Most ALC instructors have master's degrees in Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). Since many of them have lived and worked in other countries, they understand the challenges that ALC participants experience as they adapt to the language and life of the United States.

Because individuals have different learning styles, our instructional approach incorporates a variety of strategies and techniques. ALC instructors do everything possible to be helpful, to create a comfortable learning environment, and to encourage students to take an active role in their learning. All ALC instructors and staff are committed to providing the highest level of customer service.



Support Services

The services that accompany an English language program are often just as important as the program itself. Dedicated UCLA Extension and ALC staff assist you in getting settled in Los Angeles, becoming accustomed to academic life, and providing helpful information while you are here.



Academic Counseling

The ALC academic advisor assists students with:

- · Group orientation sessions
- Deciding on their next course of study
- United States college and university application procedures
- Guidance for studying in UCLA Extension professional certificate programs

F-1 Student Visa Advising

The International Student Office (ISO) provides:

- Assistance regarding visa and immigration issues
- Preparation of documents for student visas
- Approval for travel while maintaining F-1 visa status
- Advice on visa status changes, transferring between schools, and temporary travel outside of the United States

Injury & Sickness Insurance

Injury & Sickness Insurance is included in the American Language Center's student services fees. This insurance allows you to visit a UCLA hospital or clinic if you need medical attention while you are studying at the ALC. On the first day of your program, the ALC will give you an insurance identification card and provide more detailed information on your insurance coverage. Please note: Permanent residents of the United States are not eligible for this insurance.

Library

The UCLA Library, one of the top 10 academic libraries in the U.S., has multiple locations where students can study or read. To get a library card to borrow books, bring your ALC ID and \$20 to the front desk of the Research or College Library.

Computers

ALC students can access 2 multimedia computer labs at UCLA Extension's Lindbrook Center, available after school on a first-come, first-served basis for approximately 90 minutes a day. In addition to free high-speed Internet and email access, these labs offer language-learning tools and software.

EnglishPlus.lab

EnglishPlus.lab is a free after-school program (available 5 days a week) for all full-time ALC students who want to improve specific English skills. The EnglishPlus.lab instructor guides students through computer-based language learning activities to practice skills such as grammar, listening, TOEFL, pronunciation, and more.

Language Partner Program

The Language Partner Program matches interested ALC students with Americans who are studying a foreign language so they can meet and practice their language skills. For example, a Korean student can meet with an American who is studying Korean, and they can have conversations in English and in Korean. Not only do the conversation partners have a chance to practice the language they're studying, they also have an opportunity to become acquainted with one another's culture. This voluntary program is organized by an ALC academic advisor.

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Student Life

As an ALC student, you'll have access to UCLA's recreational facilities, the ability to explore Los Angeles during field trips, and enjoy entertainment and culinary experiences available in Westwood Village.

Housing

ALC students typically live off campus, usually in privately-owned residence halls, homestays, or furnished apartments. Off-campus, non-UCLA housing is available yearround; students make reservations directly with housing providers. A list of housing options is available on our website (see above). UCLA on-campus housing is available in summer only; see *housing.ucla.edu* for details.

UCLA Recreation Privileges

At the beginning of the program, you'll receive an ALC ID card. This will permit you to use a variety of recreational facilities on campus, including:

- Los Angeles Tennis Center:8 lighted tennis courts
- Sunset Canyon Recreation Center:
 25- and 50-meter pools with picnic/barbecue areas

- John Wooden Recreation and Sports Center: fitness center, racquetball, basketball, and rock climbing
- Marina Aquatic Center: located on the Pacific Ocean-for sailing, windsurfing, and kayaking

For a small additional fee, you can take courses in fitness, dance, martial arts, tennis, and swimming. These classes are great ways to learn new skills, relieve stress, and meet other UCLA students with similar interests.

Class Field Trips

In addition to in-class study, many of our students go on field trips with their instructors to various points of interest around Los Angeles. Field trip locations might include museums, courthouses, high schools, and businesses. These trips take place during class time to enrich your studies and provide an interesting look at the local community and culture.

Local Tours

The ALC works closely with an independent tour company that schedules tours to local attractions and events in the Los Angeles area, such as Hollywood, the Getty Museum, Disneyland, and L.A. Lakers and Dodgers games. Excursions can also be arranged to other destinations in California and the Southwestern U.S., such as the Grand Canyon, Las Vegas, and San Francisco.

Transportation

Southern California Attractions

Amusement Parks

Southern California features some of the most exciting amusement parks in the country. Frequent tours are organized to Disneyland, Universal Studios (with its working movie studio and a wide variety of rides), and Magic Mountain (known for its thrill rides). Just over 2 hours away by car are San Diego's Sea World and the world-famous San Diego Zoo and Safari Park.

Museums

The Los Angeles area is home to many world-class museums, including the UCLA Hammer Museum, Getty Museum and Villa, Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Norton Simon Museum, and Huntington Library and Gardens.

Hollywood

The birthplace of the movie industry, Hollywood is about 30 minutes away from UCLA. The Hollywood Walk of Fame and Chinese Theatre, Madame Tussauds Hollywood, and Paramount Pictures are just a few of the many attractions and places to visit in "Tinseltown."

The Beach

Santa Monica State Beach is located just 6.6 miles (10 km) from Westwood Village and is accessible by bus. The beach features bike paths, volleyball courts, surfing lessons, numerous shops and restaurants, and a world-famous pier with roller coasters.

Sports

Los Angeles hosts many professional sports teams, including baseball's L.A. Dodgers, basketball's L.A. Clippers and L.A. Lakers, hockey's L.A. Kings, and soccer's L.A. Galaxy. If you prefer to participate rather than watch, you can swim or surf at beautiful beaches, ski or hike in nearby mountains, or explore the rugged beauty of the desert.







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Frequently Asked Questions

Is Los Angeles safe? The American Language Center and the UCLA campus are located in Westwood Village, one of the safest neighborhoods in the city.

What is the difference between UCLA and UCLA Extension? The University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) is a comprehensive research university that offers bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees. UCLA Extension is the branch of UCLA focused on world-class career preparation and training, with courses taught by industry professionals and leaders. All courses offer a UCLA-approved education, with many available for college credit.

What are the requirements to study at the ALC?

You need to be at least 18 years old by the program start date. The full-time intensive programs require F-1 student visas and application materials to be submitted before arrival in the U.S. TOEFL or IELTS scores are required for Pre-Master's Preparation only.

Is there an application deadline? We recommend applying 8 weeks before your program start date to guarantee space availability and to allow enough time to obtain an F-1 visa.

Can I arrive after the program begins? Students may arrive no later than the end of the first week of instruction.

Can I attend a 3- or 4-week program on a tourist (B-1/B-2) visa? Tourist (B-1/B-2) visas are accepted only for American Culture and Communication (ACC), a part-time morning course designed for people visiting the United States on a short-term basis for business or pleasure.

How do I find and reserve housing? The ALC provides information about residence halls, furnished apartments, and homestays. You may request UCLA on-campus summer housing information through the ALC. All off-campus non-UCLA housing reservations must be made directly with the housing providers. We strongly recommend that you arrange your accommodations at least 30 days before the start date of your program. Housing contracts and arrangements are not the responsibility of the American Language Center; see page 4 for housing details.

How long does it take to learn English? It depends on your current language level, motivation, and exposure to English outside of class. Beginning-level students usually need a year of intensive English instruction before applying to an American university.

How will you decide my class level? You will take a placement test on the first day of school and be placed in the correct English level (Basic, Intermediate, or Advanced).

How many students will be in my class? Class size varies from 15 to 22 students. The average class size is about 18.

Who will my classmates be (age, nationality, etc.)?

Your classmates will be international students from all over the world. Most students are between 18 and 30 years of age.

Will I automatically be admitted to UCLA if I study in your English program? No, admission to full-time study at UCLA requires a separate application process. Even if you're studying in the most advanced levels of our intensive programs, you need to follow UCLA's admission and departmental requirements and meet all application deadlines.

Will your English program help me prepare for the TOEFL or IELTS? Yes. ALC classes offer the necessary skills that you need for these standardized tests. In addition, the ALC offers TOEFL and IELTS preparation courses as electives.

If my English is advanced, will your English courses still be useful for me? Advanced students whose scores are below 100 on the TOEFL (iBT) still benefit from the high-level vocabulary, essay writing, and critical thinking skills included in advanced-level courses.

Do I get a certificate after I finish your program? Yes, if you satisfactorily complete the program.

Can I get a job while studying at your school?

If you have an F-1 student visa, you may work only on the UCLA campus. Work hours cannot exceed 20 hours a week while you attend school full-time, and 40 hours a week during vacation.

What if I'm under the age of 18 and I want to study at the ALC? The ALC does not offer programs for students under the age of 18. However, Summer Discovery (www.summerdiscovery.com/ucla) admits younger students to its program on the UCLA campus.

Can I take UCLA or UCLA Extension classes while I study English? Yes. Students who place into AIEP level 106A may take one UCLA or UCLA Extension course with special permission.

Who Should Attend This Program?

The Academic Intensive English Program is best suited for students who:

- Want to prepare for study in an American college or university, or
- Plan to study English for personal or professional reasons, using a rigorous, academic approach

Course Length

- 10 weeks in winter, spring, and fall
- 12 or 6 weeks in summer
- Total of 23 class sessions (50 minutes each) per week
- During most sessions, there are no Friday afternoon classes; however, Friday afternoon classes may be necessary when enrollments are large.

Description of Levels & Average TOEFL Scores

AIEP has 7 levels: 100 (Basic) through 106 (Advanced).

Approximate TOEFL iBT scores are listed for each level to give students a general idea of how AIEP levels compare to TOEFL scores. A TOEFL or IELTS score is not required to enroll in AIEP.

Teaching Approach

- Equal emphasis on all skills: reading, writing, listening, speaking, and grammar
- Interactive classroom activities: pair work, group work, panel discussions, and communication games
- Academic skills and "critical thinking" approaches at the advanced levels
- Multimedia and Internet-based lessons and community visits to reinforce classroom material

Curriculum

- Core classes: grammar, reading, and writing at all levels
- Elective classes: chosen by students at the high-intermediate and advanced levels according to their interests and goals
- Students in level 106 may have the option to take a UCLA or a UCLA Extension class for credit (additional fees apply).

Pre-Master's Preparation

Pre-Master's Preparation prepares students to enter U.S. graduate programs and includes 2 quarters with 24 – 27 hours of instruction per week.

Admission requirements:

- Pre-Master's Preparation application
- Minimum scores of 69 85 on TOEFL iBT or 6.0 7.0 on IELTS. (Students applying to business, law or medical programs must score at the upper end of the range shown. Note: A TOEFL/IELTS score is not required for students transferring from AIEP with grades of A- or better in their core classes and an instructor's recommendation.)
- University transcript(s) for all courses taken in your last degree program with a GPA comparable to 3.0 on a 4.0 scale
- Statement of purpose
- Résumé or curriculum vitae (if available)
- Interview (by Skype or in person)

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Intensive English Communication Program (IECP)

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Who Should Attend This Program?

The Intensive English Communication Program (IECP) is designed for students who want to improve their English communication skills for personal and professional purposes.

Teaching Approach

- Emphasis on listening & speaking skills
- Interactive classroom activities: pair work, group work, panel discussions, and communication games
- Class activities build vocabulary used in everyday situations, listening comprehension, fluency, and confidence in speaking English
- Multimedia and Internet-based lessons and short field trips to reinforce classroom material

Curriculum

Mornings

Students who test into the Basic Level use an integrated skills textbook with a variety of topics to improve their English. Topics focus on everyday situations such as ordering food, asking for directions, traveling, making a purchase, understanding instructions, and carrying on a conversation. Students who test into the Intermediate and Advanced levels choose topic courses from 2 out of 3 menus: Academic, Business, and Culture.

Course Length

- IECP offers a monthly 4-week session, a 12-week program in the winter, spring, and fall quarters, and one 3-week session at the end of the summer.
- Students can enroll for 4, 8, or 12 weeks per quarter, for up to 9 consecutive quarters, with new study material in each 4-week session.
- Classes meet Monday through Thursday for a total of 20 class sessions (50 minutes each) per week
- Friday classes are scheduled the first week of each session, and sometimes to make up for holidays that occur during the week.

Description of Levels

- 3 levels (Basic, Intermediate, and Advanced)
- Students at the Basic Level may be reassigned to the Academic Intensive English Program


American Culture & Communication (ACC) Course

The ACC Course is designed for individuals, 18 years or older, who are coming to L.A. primarily for business, tourism, and/or family visits. This course is for part-time study only and does not qualify for the F-1 student visa.

ACC allows participants to improve their English and learn more about American culture and life in Southern California through three 50-minute morning sessions, 4 days per week. Possible topics include Pop Culture Discussion, America Through Television, Media Studies, Grammar Focus, Idioms, Business English, and more. Dates correspond to the IECP schedule.

All ACC applications must be submitted in person at the ALC administrative office. ACC is for individual participants only, not for groups of students.

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
Advanced Study Options

UCLA Extension Course

Students in level 105 or above may take one UCLA Extension course with the recommendation of the ALC academic advisor. Please visit *uclaextension.edu* for more information.

UCLA Course - Open Doors Enrollment Program

Students who complete level 105 and continue in level 106 may enroll in either a UCLA Extension course or a UCLA credit course with the recommendation of the ALC academic advisor. Please visit *uclaextension.edu/enrollALC* for more information.

UCLA Summer Sessions Course

Students in level 106 who meet all course requirements may enroll in one UCLA Summer Sessions course for an additional fee, with the recommendation of the ALC academic advisor. Please visit *summer.ucla.edu* for more information.

Full-time Study Options with Completion of AIEP

UCLA Extension Certificate Programs

UCLA Extension offers more than 50 certificate programs for professional development in fields such as business, entertainment studies, computers, and graphic design. These certificate programs are approved for F-1 visa status. Please visit *uclaextension.edu/intc* for more information.

Eligibility

Admission is open to international students who have the equivalent of a U.S. high school education and who achieve a specific minimum TOEFL iBT or IELTS score within the last 2 years. Students who have graduated from an accredited U.S. college with associate's degree or higher do not have to submit test scores. ALC students completing level 106 with an overall grade of A- or higher are eligible to enter most UCLA Extension certificate programs without taking the TOEFL iBT or IELTS.

Optional Practical Training (OPT) uclaextension.edu/opt

After completing a certificate program that is 9 months or longer, international students can apply for 12 months of Optional Practical Training (OPT) in a field related to their completed certificate.

Costs

Most UCLA Extension certificate programs are 3 or 4 quarters in length (1 quarter = 3 months). The cost of courses per quarter ranges between \$1,700 and \$3,000 plus living expenses of about \$5,000 per quarter. The average total cost of most programs (9-12 months) is between \$7,000 and \$12,000.

UCLA Extension or UCLA programs.

- Participants who take a UCLA Extension course or credit course receive an official transcript from UCLA Extension. UCLA Summer Session courses will appear on a separate UCLA transcript.
- The decision to accept transfer credit depends on individual colleges and universities, not UCLA or UCLA Extension.

College and University Programs

Community Colleges

ALC students who want to pursue undergraduate degrees in the U.S. can start at a community college for their first 2 years of study and then transfer to a University of California (UC), California State University (CSU), or a private university to complete a bachelor's degree.

4-Year Colleges and Universities

An ALC academic advisor can provide a variety of information on California and other U.S. undergraduate and graduate programs. For most colleges and universities, students must submit their applications 6 to 9 months before the start of a degree program.

Career Training Programs

Students may pursue career training in vocational schools and community colleges in such fields as automotive technology, cosmetology, culinary arts, electronics, and fashion design.

Cooperating TOEFL/IELTS Institutions

The institutions listed below have agreed to waive language proficiency requirements, e.g. TOEFL & IELTS, if ALC students have completed 1 of the 2 advanced AIEP levels. Completion of AIEP level 105 is required for community colleges, level 106 for 4-year colleges and universities.
